"I had an excellent time helping the kids, and I enjoy doing it every year," sophomore Jenny Lefforge said.



studies, thus interfering with things such as sports, drama and music.








Northwestern Gets Edged By Faulkton



Some farmers weigh their calves after they wean them. If you have registered cattle you have to do this. One problem that many ranchers are facing is their feedlots being too muddy. The mud leads to the calves getting foot rot. Foot rot causes calves to go lame and is treated with antibiotics.

The crops are finally starting to get harvested. It is still extremely muddy and farmers have to leave a lot of their crop in the field. When the ground freezes they can go back out and get everything they missed.




