Third-Grader's Transplant a Success

The past year has been one full of ups and downs for one Northwestern student. Third-grader Triten Heber has been in and out of the hospital since early December.

Triten was born with a condition called Ellis-van Crevald syndrome and has had to undergo numerous surgeries in the past ten years. On Dec. 1, 2009, Triten was taken to the doctor because his mother felt that something wasn't quite right. Later that day, they found out that Triten had renal failure. From Abereen, he was driven to Sioux Falls to Sanford Children's Hospital. Triten was admitted into ICU, where he remained for the next four days.

While in the hospital, Triten has had to experience many different treatments and surgeries. One of the surgeries included emergency surgery to replace a leaking blood vessel.

After being on the waiting list and hoping for the best, the doctors found a donor for Triten, and he had his kidney transplant on April 12. The surgery that was supposed to take four hours; instead, it took nine. The new kidney clotted so

the doctors had to remove it and flush the fluid. It was a slow process to get the new kidney to wake up and work inside his body. The new kidney has a severe symptom called ATN, but it will heal itslef in time.

The hospital stay has definitely been eventful and challenging. Triten is battling high temperatures and loss of sleep. The most recent event to occur was the removal of the staples around his incision from his transplant. He is begginning to be able to get out of bed; he can sit in a wheelchair and can walk short distances. Overall, he is doing pretty well now; he sleeps most of the time but is awake more now than he was in the past weeks.

"He's being a trooper," his mother, Jessica Sheridan, said.

The doctors and family are hoping that Triten will be released from the hospital in a couple weeks. After being released, he will have to stay in Sioux Falls for six weeks of observation.

Triten is expected to return to school next year. As for this year, Triten has been being tutored to keep up with his school-





The Northwestern Elementary children raised \$47.91 for the American Red Cross in the month of March. The students raised the money by bringing loose change to school and putting them in jars.




Northwestern Gymnasium Transformed for "Under the Sea" Prom




At left, junior Logen Lechner escorts his date, senior Tristen Waller, through grand march.

"The prom was a good time. The juniors did a good job, but it still doesn't compare to last year's prom," Wood said.




At left, senior Landon Gab escorts his date, sophomore Mariah Taylor, through grand march.


At right, senior Jenna Larson gets escorted through grand march by her date, Mitch Friedt.




