Derek Boekelheide places 23rd in state event

Sixth-grader Derek Boekelheide made math history by being the first Northwestern student to advance to state MathCounts, an event for students who exceed in math to come together to compete by taking difficult math tests.

This organization encourages students to focus on academic achievement.

"Competing in the state Math-Counts was really cool and interesting," Boekelheide said.

The event took place in Pierre, S.D., on Friday, March 11-12.

Boekelheide, his mother Kris and Mrs. Amanda Fa'onelua, the math teacher at NW, stayed at the Kings Hotel.

Boekelheide did not compete until Saturday. He took tests and competed all day Saturday.

"I would love to compete again at state MathCounts. It was a really neat experience," Boekelhiede said.

Out of a total 48 students in grades six through eight competing, Boekelheide placed 23rd.

At the competition, there were only two students from "B" schools. The other 46 stu-

dents were from "A" or "AA" schools.

Also, there were only three sixth-graders attending state math counts.

"It is exciting to see North-western have students who can compete in academic state events such as this. Derek is an excellent student, and he will go far. I hope to see more students thriving to achieve such honors," Fa'onelua said.



Finley Awarded Davis-Bahcall Opportunity Scholarship

Amanda Finley, a senior at Northwestern, was one of the recipients for the Davis-Bahcall Opportunity Scholarship. Students who receive this scholarship may have the opportunity to go to a trip to Italy July 23 to Aug. 13.

Both seniors in high school and freshmen in college were among the 10 students chosen.

Recipients have three different rounds to go through before chosen to receive this scholarship.

In the first round, students needed to send in their grades, write a 500-word essay and send their Scholastic Aptitude Test and American College Testing scores.

After sending in what was needed, 30 students were chosen to be interviewed for 30 minutes. Judges were able to pick only 10 students to be awarded the scholarship. The judges picked five males and five females, of whom seven were in high school and three were in college.

When the program first starts, the students chosen will leave for two weeks. They will tour home sick mines and do a group research project. After that, it will depend on funding who will travel to Italy. If they cannot travel, the students will take a trip to the Fermi Lab in Iowa. Winners will get a mentorship.

"It is amazing. Having Amanda at our school doing this, makes younger children think they can do what she does. She is a great role model to everybody," sophomore Kelsey Hoellein said.

Some people may think that obtaining this scholar-ship would be very difficult to do. To Finley it seems easy. For her it is like writing an essay on something she loves. Everything comes very naturally to her.

"I think it will be a great experience for me and my future," Finley said.

Awhile ago, Clemens went to


tour the college and personally talk to the head football coach.

ings, she delivered mail to her assigned Senators and sat in on committees.


"My favorite committee was probably the Agriculture and Natural Resources committee, which heard a bill about opening the prairie dog hunting season to year round," Fischbach said.

There will be 3 students driving per week. The students will take a 15-minute break for supper. Starting the week of May 16 there will be 3 groups of 3 students for the driving portion of the class. The schedule will be 8:00-11:30, 11:30-3:30, 3:30-7:00. The driving will be when school is out for the summer.

The cost of driver's ed. is \$150 per student. After each student has completed driver's ed. and has scored an 80% on the written and driving test they must ride with an adult for at least 90 days.

At the event, people could either buy scrapbooking supplies and assemble a scrapbook at


home, or they could assemble the scrapbook while attending the event.


Junior Laine Mielke and Stuck sold cans of pop to raise money for the gas to be used to travel to Girls State in Vermillion.


Cadet Sergeant Herbert Jockheck from West Point Millitary Academy spoke to Northwestern students Friday, March 11.

Jockheck spoke about the different levels of military training. Also, he explained what kind of schooling a student would have to go through.



"He was informative on what to look forward to West Point. He was very interesting and fun to listen to. There was a lot of good information he gave out to us," junior Jared Fischer said.











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








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Students Attend
