Students in grades eight through 12 participated in the South Dakota Highway Patrol program on driving safely Jan. 5.

The Alive @ 25 program taught by SDHP trooper Chanda Derby, trooper Todd Albertson and trooper Desmond Watson provided students with an opportunity to examine their own driving strenghts and weaknesses.

The SDHP came from Rapid City to teach Northwestern students a four-section class on driving properly and responsibly.

"I will definitely be more cautious and aware of my surroundings and I will be more aware of other drivers," junior Katrina Frericks said.

The main purpose of this course was to show Northwestern students that motor vehicle crashes are the number one

causes of death in the 15-24 age groups.

The teenagers participated in watching videos, listening to the instructor and doing role play. Each instructor shared stories of the times he or she has encountered when teenagers were not smart while driving. The students received booklets describing what people should do on the road. For taking the class, some students may receive lower insurance rates.

"Ninety-nine percent of life is not what happens to you but how you respond to it," Watson

Students learned to recognize the hazard, understand the proper defense and to act correctly in time.

Potential issues discussed included texting, drinking and driving, wearing safety belts, and other aspects of distracted teen driving.

#### **NORTHWESTERN AREA PRESCHOOL SCREENING**

The Northwestern Area School District will be screening children who will be three years old on or before March 14, 2010 or five years old on or before September 1, 2011. Any four year olds that were not screened last year are also encouraged to be screened at this time. The screening will take place on Monday, March 14, 2011 in the Northwestern Elementary addition.

The screening includes children who will be in the 2011-2012 Kindergarten class.

Children will be screened in gross and fine motor skills, general concepts, communications skills, vision and hearing. Additionally, the county nurse will be available to give general physical examinations to the upcoming kindergarten class members. Early identification of difficulties can help alleviate health or educational problems, which may develop during a child's education.

As part of the school's "Child Identification Project," HEARTLAND HANDS OF BIRTH TO THREE CONNECTIONS, Rich Jankord, will be available on the testing date to screen children who are younger than three years of age upon request. Mr. Jankord will be available only if appointments are made in advance through the school.

This is a FREE service provided by the school district. The screenings take approximately 45 minutes.

If you are interested in having your child screened, please contact Jessica Halvorson at 887-3467 x110 between 7:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. (at least 10 days before the screening) to make an appointment. After appointments have been received, letters will be sent to each family who has called and made an appointment to verify their time slot for March 14th.



"I am very excited this year for our play because it is very exciting and has a stirring ending! We all have a great time with learning each character and putting our own spin on the characters.



"I think the iPads are a great learning tool for our kids. We haven't used them a lot so far, but we plan on using them a great deal for math and hopeful-




Third-grader Talley Sparling learns how to use the iPads in Mrs. Marilyn Battey's class.

ly for reading books on them," fifth-grade teacher Mr. Wade Rozell said.



Northwestern recently purchased 150 iPads.





Promise rings appear to be a popular entity lately and especially at this time of year. After doing some research, however, it seems like a promise ring means something different to each person.






