After each group did all the tests and found their results, they had to write a lab report with their data and results.




On Tuesday, Nov. 30, the Northwestern Future Business leaders of America held a Blood Drive.


"It is enjoyable to go through the process and know it is needed to help others," senior Hilary Frericks said.


"It was a pretty enjoyable time. Since I am a state officer. it was kind of nice to be able to meet some more of the people from around the state," Franck


said.







Problems with broken computers and keyboards already exist within the school, so adding 150 touch screens to the mix seems problematic. A touch screen can much more easily be broken or cracked.


Also, the iPads are being purchased for the elementary


