SCHOOL MAKES NEW RULES & IMPROVEMENTS

This year some of the rules in the school have been modified. Some have been entirely redone, and some were just tweaked a little.

The new Saturday school rule enforces the misbehaved student to start at 8 a.m. and end at noon instead of ending at 10 a.m.

Cell phones can now be on hand instead of turned off and in the locker, just as long as they don't disturb class. If a student disturbs the class, he or she will receive three Saturday school points. On the second offense, the phone will be taken away, and the student will again receive three Saturday school points.

The staff will enforce the dress code much more than previous years. If jeans have holes that are not fully patched, the student will be told to change into sweatpants. Any inappropriate shirts will be covered with one of the wellprinted shirts made in the screen printing room.

All other rules have not been altered. A full list of rules, including the three in this article can be found in the school handbook online.

The school has also undergone some changes and improvements.

Of all the changes, the most noticeable is the newly paved parking lot. The student parking lot on the north side of school is now fully paved and has painted parking spaces. The lot now includes a clearly marked handicapped parking space and a space reserved for the student of the month.

Another change is the new crows nest on the football field. The old nest was blown over in a storm last spring.

The inside of the school has had a few changes as well. The high school library is now a smaller size, due to a new office for principal Rich Osborn; guidance counselor Sue Neiger now has Osborn's old office. The small room in between the two now serves as the student lounge.

Mrs. Anne Frericks' room also now has air conditioning units.

School Board Highlights

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE NWA SCHOOL BOARD MEETING, AUGUST 9, 2010

HATS will continue with a 5 day school week. Those on a 4 day school week will need to come in one Friday a month

Visual Communications program is on hold due to lack of time to get new equipment. If there is enough interest there is a possibility HATS will have it 2nd semester.

The north side of the HATS parking lot will be paved.

The crow's nest construction will begin this week. It will be ready by the first home football game.

The parking lot in back has been paved and striped.

The Dept of Ed has released the district scores from the Dakota Step tests. Northwestern has made the required AYP (annual yearly progress) under the no child left behind goals. You may view these scores on the DOE web site: https://nclb.ddncampus.net/nclb/index.html and clicking on the 2010 report card & selecting Northwestern School from the side panel.

Consolidated Application was approved by the State.

There will be a stricter enforcement of the dress code for the 10-11 school year. The dress code is as follows:

Caps/hats will not be allowed in classes, hallways or inside the building. No biker, boxer, athletic shorts or short shorts are to be worn in school. No bare midriff tops, spaghetti straps, low cut tops or pants are allowed. Also, jeans with holes exposing any skin or undergarments, ripped, or excessive baggy, low riding pants or tight clothing is prohibited. Undergarments should not be showing at all. Clothing with alcohol, tobacco advertisements or vulgar statements is prohibited.

Approved the resolution to request authorization of referendum to allow employees to receive Social Security coverage.

Second reading & approval of Attendance Policy.

The administration and teaching staff of Northwestern Area School believe that a student's contribution to classes and achievements are directly related to attendance. Therefore, any students with excessive absences will usually be subject to a special attendance program. Phone calls, School Reach messages, or letters will be used to contact parents to inform them of concerns. Most students have fewer than five absences a year. In order to encourage regular attendance, the following procedures will be in

For each semester (Grades 9-12):

1. If a student is absent from a class for 4 blocks of a class (8 carnegie), the parents will receive a letter of concern from Administration.

2. If a student is absent from a class for 9 blocks of a class (18 carnegie)*, a truancy (Child in Need of Supervision) petition may be filed with the State's Attorney, parents will receive a letter of notification of the truancy, and a counselor or principal will be assigned to monitor absences.

*If a student is absent from a particular class for 9 blocks (18 carnegie), the student will receive a grade of F for that course and parents will receive a letter of notification of that failure. Parents do have the opportunity to appeal to the Northwestern Area Board of Education if absences are due to extenuating circumstances.

*On average a block schedule allows for 43 class meetings per semester. If a child missed 9 of these 43 meetings they would be missing 20% of the class. For each trimester (Grades 6-8):

If a student is absent from a class for 3 blocks of a class (6 carnegie), the parents will receive a letter of concern from Administration.

If a student is absent from a class for 6 blocks of a class (11 carnegie)*, a truancy (Child in Need of Supervision) petition may be filed with the State's Attorney, parents will receive a letter of notification of the truancy, and a counselor or principal will be assigned to monitor absences.

*If a student is absent from a particular class for 6 blocks (11 carnegie), the student will receive a grade of F for that course and parents will receive a letter of notification of that failure. Parents do have the opportunity to appeal to the Northwestern Area Board of Education if absences are due to extenuating circumstances.

*On average a block schedule allows for 29 meetings per trimester. If a child missed 6 of these 29 meetings they would be missing 20% of the class. For each quarter (Grades K-5):


Students missing 5 or more days in a quarter will have their parent or guardian contacted by the Principal concerning the absences.

2. If a student is absent for more than 15 days in the school year, a truancy (Child in Need of Supervision) petition may be filed with the State's Attorney, parents will re ceive a letter of notification of the truancy, and a counselor or principal will be assigned

SHOULD WE TIE DAKOTA STEP TEST SCORES TO SENIOR PRIVILEGES?

Northwestern teachers always encourage their students to perform well on tests; they especially promote excellent test scores on the Dakota Step Tests, as the scoring is compared statewide with other schools and is used for No Child Left Behind.

Over the past two years, the administration has started to offer extra incentive to the junior class to do well on these tests by tying each student's Dakota Step Test scores in with their senior privileges.

Students who achieve three advanced scores on the test get their senior privileges starting at the beginning of their senior year; students who receive two advanced scores get their privileges second quarter; one perfect score earns the student privileges at third quarter. Every senior receives full privileges at the beginning of the fourth quarter, regardless of test scores.

Tying in the student's scoring on such an important test with senior privileges encourages the students to study and to take the test seriously because every senior wants senior

while before they can have their senior privileges because they did not do perfect on their Dakota Step test, but they still do well on any other test or assignment and

have high grade point

averages.
Some students may try their hardest to receive a good score, but they still cannot reach the score that they wished to get. In this case, they are almost punished for not receiving a high enough score that other students can receive easier than others.

Everyone in the school finds out how well the students did on their tests by which students privileges as soon as possible. Senior privileges give students the opportunity to eat off campus for lunch and to leave school early if they have a study hall.

Pushing the students to do well on tests is always a fine idea, especially when comparing NW to other schools.

Many jobs require that employees pass a test, such as teachers, doctors and lawyers. This is good practice for the real world.

Providing the students with something to work toward, other than just a "pat on the back" may just give the students the extra oomph that they need.

All students, regardless of test scores, receive their senior privileges for the entire fourth quarter; however, singling out those students who scored better could make those who did not score well feel badly about themselves academically.

Other considerations are that students use the privileges to go to the MTP to buy food and that many students cannot leave campus anyway because of the distance between home and school.
