In the first round of the state tournament, the Northwestern Wildcats played Herried/Selby Area on Thurs., Nov. 17 in the Sioux Falls Arena in three sets. Senior Jussy Tuscherer led aces with seven, and senior Haley Wetzler and sophomore Jeanna Duncan tied with four aces. The team had a total of 36 kills. Tuscherer led with 18 kills and junior Ashley Clemens with 13. NW had a total of 34 assists. Senior Mariah Taylor led with 31 assists and Duncan with three. The Wildcats had 42 digs. Tuscherer obtained 10 digs, and freshman Kennedi Sparling followed close behind with nine digs.

> 35 kills. Clemens came in second with 15 kills. The team set a total of 53 assists. Senior Mariah Taylor led with 44 assists, and sophomore Jeanna Duncan

had three assists. The Wildcats had 70 total digs. Wetzler had 14, Tuscherer had 13, and Taylor and Duncan had seven. The Wildcats won the eighth State B Volleyball Championship for Northwestern.



Tuscherer Signs for Northern



"Jussy is phenomenal athlete who loves the game of volleyball. Her fiery spirit and competitive nature



The Northwestern Wildcats lost to the Warner Monarchs Sept. 27 in four sets, 25-18, 21-25, 21-25 and 11-25. The Wildcats served a total of 69 of 75 times with five aces. Freshman Christine Morgan served 18 for 18 with two aces. Senior Mariah Taylor served 12 for 14 with one ace. Senior Jussy Tuscherer served 10 for 12 with one ace. The team attacked 105 of 118 total times with 40 kills. Tuscherer had 40 of 47 attacks with 20 kills. Junior Ashley Clemens had 29 of 36 attacks with 13 kills. Taylor had 16 of 17 attacks with three kills. NW set a total of 115 of 115 times with 39 assists. Taylor had 98 of 98 sets with 32 assists. Sophomore Jeanna Duncan set 11 for 11 with six assists. 


Regions: Northwestern Annihilates Summit
