
"I was, so grateful to have experience, and to have met all of the other girls at the pageant. It is a weekend I will



# Elementary Students Experience Golden Dragon Acrobats



- The screening includes all children who will be in the 2012-2013 Kindergarten class.
- Children will be screened in gross and fine motor skills, general concepts, communications skills, vision and hearing. Additionally, the county nurse will be available to give general physical examinations to the upcoming kindergarten class members. Early identification of difficulties can help alleviate health or educational probems, which may develop during a child's education.
- As part of the school's "Child Identification Project," HEARTLAND HANDS OF BIRTH TO THREE CONNECTIONS, Rich Jankord, will be available on the testing date to screen children who are younger than three
  years of age upon request. Mr. Jankord will be available only if appointments are made in advance through the
  school.
- This is a FREE service provided by the school district. The screenings take approximately 45 minutes.
- If you are interested in having your child screened, please contact Kristi Smith at 887-3467 x110 between 7:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. (at least 10 days before the screening) to make an appointment. After appointments have been received, letters will be sent to each family of who has called and made an appointment to verify their time slot for March 12th.





This movie bursts with excitement and near death experiences that will leave you




crossing your fingers and sitting at the edge of your seat.
