Former Graduates Return From Marines

2011 senior graduates Jerry Serfling and Casey Bade spoke to social studies classes on Friday, Sept. 9 after being at Marine boot camp for the summer. The two men also presented the flags at the home football game that night.

The boot camp they attended was in San Diego, Calif., and was not the easiest to overcome. Both men talked about the struggles of going through the camp and what conditions they lived under. The boot camp was a basic training for military recruits and gave the impression of "once in, can't leave."

The men were in separate platoons, so they did not see each other often. During the training, cell phones were not allowed, which meant they could make no phone calls. Letters were accepted. There was no free time except for the one hour the men received at night to gather all their stuff together. In training, the men should have received eight

hours of sleep. Sometimes this did not happen due to other things they needed to finish.

The first night they were there was the day for shots, medical examinations and paperwork. The men were kept up all night to feel the lack of sleep and the struggle military personnel need to overcome.

Serfling and Bade both agree that "the Crucible" was the worst part of training. In the "Crucible" training, the men survive three days with one meal of food and three hours of sleep per day. They had a lot of hiking, and at the end were told to

climb "The Reaper," a very steep hill that they needed to hike with a pack on their back.

"You could practically touch the hill ["The Reaper"]; it was so steep," Serfling said.

During training, the men only had three minutes to eat. When they walked into the meal room, people were eating very fast; it did not matter what they were eating.

"[It was a] massacre in the chow hall. Once you're in there, you're like 'what is this nonsense?'" Bade said.

Bade and Serfling are signed to be in the Marines for five years then are free to choose whatever road to take. Their name will still be down for four years on a kind of "reserve" where if they are needed, they will be called to volunteer to help. After the five years, Serfling plans to attend college for four years, then go into the officer program and become an officer and pilot. Bade plans to come back and work at the farm after his five years are finished.

Evan Finley Attends Leadership Seminar



Several businesses stepped forward to back up the Wildcats in getting a new set of scoreboards for the gym. Ten community and nearby business owners helped to purchase the new, and greatly needed, merchandise. Students Recieve AP Scholar Awards: Leonhardt, Fischbach and Finley Top Performers

Three students from the Northwestern Area High School graduating class of 2011 have earned AP Scholar Awards in recognition of their exceptional achievement on AP Exams.

The College Board's Advanced Placement Program® (AP®) provides willing and academically prepared students with the opportunity to take rigorous college-level courses while still in high school, and to earn college credit, advanced placement, or both for successful performance on the AP Exams. About 18 percent of the more than 1.9 million students worldwide who took AP Exams performed at a sufficiently high level to also earn an AP Scholar Award.

At Northwestern Area High School, one student qualified for the AP Scholar with Honor Award by earning an average score of at least 3.25 on all AP Exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on four or more of these exams. This student is Elizabeth Leonhardt who had an average of 4.75 on a 5 point scale on the four exams taken. Elizabeth received a perfect score of 5 on three of the four exams taken with the other receiving a 4. This has never before been accomplished by any student at Northwestern!

Two students qualified for the AP Scholar Award by completing three or more AP Exams with scores of 3 or higher. The AP Scholars are Amanda Finley and Kara Fischbach.

Northwestern Area is very excited to have three students out of a class of 23 receive these honors. These types of achievements are attributed to the quality teachers at Northwestern and the hard work and commitment of the students.

"I am just so proud of our students, not only these three, but all of the AP English students and their scores this year," English teacher Mrs. Nora Groft said.

Eight of the 10 students in Groft's AP English class passed

one or both of the AP English exams given in May.

Through 34 different collegelevel courses and exams, AP provides willing and academically prepared students with the opportunity to earn college credit or advanced placement and stand out in the college admission process. The idea of the game is to shatter this disk or at least chip it. They either hit or miss.

Each round consists of five disks per player, after the round they slide to the second of five positions

After each participant has gone through and shot his or her five rounds, twenty-five shots per player, that person is done with the first half.

By adding up and averaging out the teams scores, the coach decides how far back the students need to move. Then, at that given spot, they begin again, with another five rounds of five shots.

"I can't wait to do it again next year!" Miles said.




The NFL PUNT, PASS & KICK (PPK) program is a national skills competition for boys and girls between the ages of 6 and 15 to compete separately against their peers.

No football shoes, turf shoes, cleats or bare feet are allowed. Only soft-sole gym shoes are permitted.





Wildcats **Defeat Wagner**



Boekelheide placed seventh with a time of 8.17 and Groft had a time of 8.55, receiving 17th.

In the Webster meet Sept. 12, Franco placed 14th with a time of 19.33 in the boys 5,000-meter run. D. Leonhardt finished with a time of 19:44, placing 18th. In the junior varsity, H. Leonhardt received 36th place with a time of 14.10.7.

"Cross country is pretty awesome!" Franco said. At the Roncalli meet Sept.

15, Groft placed 18th in the junior varsity boys 3,000meter run with a time of 14:00. H. Leonhardt placed 16th in a time of 14:05.

The Wildcats will compete at the Faulkton cross country meet Sept. 21 before heading to the Hoven meet on Sept. 24.

The Wildcats will also run in the SDHSAA-sanctioned FLBA 5K held Oct. 1 in Mellette.

As a member of the Lake Region Conference, the Wildcats will compete at its firstever conference cross country meet on Wednesday, Oct. 5 in Ipswich at 1 p.m.

The regional meet is Oct. 12 in Webster with qualifying athletes participating in the state cross country meet Saturday, Oct. 22 in Sioux Falls, S.D.




