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



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







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




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
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## Chorus Students Attend All-State

"I love to sing. Life is a soundtrack and I think people need to appreciate that more," said junior Kalen Frericks.








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## **MathCounts Students** Place at Contest

Senior Sarah Franco volunteered to give instructions to Cross to tell him where to shoot. Cross shattered the clay pigeon and almost split the arrow in two.

"His back story was very inspirational, and his archery skills were pretty intense," junior Nathan Palmer said.


### Northwestern defeats Hitchcock-Tulare

His goal is make the to girls' basketball program as respected as the volleyball program.





The Student of the Month in November is Andrea Rausch. Her parents are Glen and Sarah Rausch. She has three siblings, Rachel, Cody and Logan.



# Carrie Underwood


