After 33 years at Northwestern, superintendent Mr. Ray Sauerwein will retire from come for both the school and for Northwestern School effective July 1.

Originally from Pierpoint, S.D., and a Grant-Duel High School graduate, Sauerwein went on to receive a degree in teaching from Northern State University in Aberdeen, S.D.

In 1981, shortly after finishing college, he first took a teaching position at Northwestern as a full-time industrial technology teacher. That same job is now occupied by Mr. Jerry Sauer.

Over the years, Sauerwein held various coaching positions, including football coach, track coach, wrestling coach (for a year) and junior high boys' basketball coach for a year,

After 20 years of teaching shop, he then went on to be the high school principal for three years and has been the superintendent for the last 10 years. Also along with being the superintendent, he is also the athletic director for the school, as well as supervisor of buildings and grounds and bus transporta-

"I have been here a long time, so leaving the school will be a big change for me. On the other hand, I think it will be a positive out-

me. Change is a good thing, and I see this being a good change for the school and communities," Sauerwein said.

Sauerwein has made a huge impact on everyone in the Northwestern School for over the past 33 years. He has left a massive mark on this school and community and will be remembered in the school district for a long time.


This year will come to an end in another month, and NW will start off the new school year with a new superintendent.




He will be the elementary principal and special educa-


Mrs. Sandy Bierman this year is retiring from the NW school. She has been here at NW for seven years. She is currently the elementary libraian and the elementary computer teacher.


"I really enjoyed being part of this play because it was really fun. I liked in the end when Ugly became a swan," Stuck said.


The matinee told the story about an ugly duckling named Ugly who gets treated poorly because of the way he looks and he was different than the rest.

Senior Tyler Carda received the March student of the month. His parents are Robert and Diane Carda. Carda's siblings are Joe, Brady, Sharla and Cole.


"Tyler is a very deserving recipient. He is extremely involved in our school and community," senior Maddie Hahler said.

The statewide science bowl competition held Sat., March 1 in Huron, featured two Wildcat teams.

Northwestern sent two teams this year with a total of nine students.

The first team consisted of junior Hans Leondhart and seniors Nicholas Wood, Kalen Frericks and Kristie Bade.

The second team consisted of freshman Derek Boekelheide, sophomores Quinn Girdeen and Chance Sale and seniors Tyler Carda and Jacob Heidenreich.

Both teams practiced a few times a week up until the time of competition.

In order to simulate the real competition, they used a device called Eggspert, which is similar to buzzers, but is shaped like eggs instead.

This year's teams could be considered extremely ambitious and motivated. They studied areas of: chemistry, geology, physiology and astrology.

The Wildcats finish the season with a 1-20 record. Senior Tyler Carda will be greatly missed next season.

Recap of the Season

The Northwestern Wildcat basketball fans said goodbye to senior Tyler Carda as he ended the season with 107 points, 35.3 percent total field goal average, 50 percent free throw average and 113 rebounds on the season.

Junior Corbin Smith led the team in scoring with 146 points. He also contributed a 29.9 percent total field goal average, 31.6 percent free throw average, 96 rebounds, 45 assists and 30 steals.

Freshman Derek Boekelheide led the team in steals and assists with 34 steals and 56 assists on the year along with 138 points, 25.3 percent total field goal average, 41.4 percent free throw average and 50 rebounds.


The young Wildcat squad had only one senior and one junior and look forward to next season.
