### Mortgage Burned at Ceremony

The Northwestern community celebrated the end of its 18-year-long mortgage for the elementary and secondary gym addition Feb. 18.

Ellen Boekelheide and Diane Bindenagel, two board members during the 1996 addition project, returned to the school to conduct the mortgage-burning ceremony during half-time of the girls' varsity basketball game against Redfield.

The remaining board members, president Orville Steward, Charles Hahler and Leroy Braun did not attend. Current superintendent Ray Sauerwein and current board member Troy Grandpre hosted the event.

"Because of the leadership and progressiveness of the Northwestern community throughout the last 44 years, today's students are blessed with an outstanding facility," Sauerwein said.

Northwestern High School, which opened in 1970, started as just the high school building and the gym. Robert Ewart, Vincent Jungwirth, Charles Little, Floyd Stoltenberg and Harold Zoodsma served on the board of education at this time. The board members, superintendent Q. C. Miles and business manager Daryl Borchard showed ambition in their forward-thinking and progressive action. Past board member Lance Fuhrman also provided input for the plans. In 1996, superintendent Mike Steinhoff and business manager Diana Larson's leadership also helped to pave the way for this addition to happen. The work of these past leaders helped create the Northwestern that our community knows and loves today.

"It was a wonderful thing for the school to

finally pay off their mortgage debt, so they can look into the future and improve things in the school," Grandpre said.

In 2004, the school board decided to refinance the addition. This resulted in a substantial amount of savings and a two-year deduction of time to pay off the loan. The school paid off the loan in January 2014, rather than 2016. To recognize this achievement, Sauerwein decided to host a mortgage burning ceremony. In this ceremony, he brought out the official copy of the mortgage and handed it to 1996 board members, Boekelheide and Bindenagel, to set it to flame. The community witnessed this event and understood the meaning behind it.

"It (the developing stages) was an exciting time for Northwestern, and over the course, there were pros and cons from people of the district. Fortunately, the majority were for adding on to the school, and it became a reality. I think it's amazing that the last payment on the addition was made two years early! What a savings for the school district; that is something that definitely needed to be recognized. I am confident that our school will continue to be progressive, and our young people

### **Duncan Receives National Girls and** Women in Sports Day Award

The National Girls and Women in Sports Day began in 1987 as a day to remember Olympic volleyball great, Flo Hyman, for her numerous athletic achievements and her work to assure equality for women's sports and to eliminate the struggles of girls and women in sport.

This year the coaching staff of girls' athletics at Northwestern honored an athlete who exemplifies qualities of excellence in sports skills, leadership, self-discipline and perseverance. This yearr's recipient of the National Girls and Women in Sports Day Outstanding Female Athlete is senior Jeanna Duncan.

A four-year starter and letter winner in volleyball, Duncan served as team captain and earned awards as assists leader, Northwestern Will-to-Win Athlete, All-Lake Region Conference, and Aberdeen American News All-Area Team for the past two years. She earned Academic All-State as a senior, All-State Honorable Mention as a junior, and Northwestern

Rookie of the Year as a freshman. Her 3.98 grade point average helped her team earn the AVCA and SDHSAA Team Academic Achievement Award each season. During Duncan's four years on the team, the varsity went 103-25, capturing the Class B State Championship in 2011. This summer, Jeanna will represent Northwestern as a member of the North All-Star team.

In track and field, Duncan advanced to the state meet in the 100-meter hurdles, the 4 x 400-meter relay, and the 4 x 200meter relay as a sophomore, placing 5th in the 4 x 200-meter relay. As a junior, Jeanna advanced to the state meet in the 100-meter hurdles, the 4 x 100-meter relay, the 4 x 200-meter relay, and the 4 x 400-meter relay. She received the team's most improved award both years.

Duncan plans to attend the University of South Dakota in Vermillion next fall. Her parents are Doug and Amy Duncan of Mellette.




"It was really hard and confusing at first, but was fun once you got the hang of it," said junior Hans Leonhardt.

"Halle is a great sudent and role model to look up to. She is very smart and is a wonderful person to work with," junior Haley Grandpre said.


