


Clark transferred from Faulkton. She misses her friends from Faulkton and says that it is different here because the classes are not separated. "Everyone was nice and welcoming." Clark


Northwestern **Defeats** Aberdeen Christian


Northwestern **Defeats Miller**

The next cross country meet will take place on Saturday Sept. 28 at Hoven.


