"It is nice to see the high school students participating in an event that can help out the community and help out those in need," business teacher Mrs.






NBA and the other four overseas.


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Juniors Job Shadow at Local Businesses

The Northwestern boys' basketball team fell to Hitchcock/Tulare 67-30 Feb. 20 in Tulare. Sophomore Derek Boekelheide led the team with eight points, three rebounds and two assists. Junior Isaac Groft followed with seven points and one assist. Eighth-grader Jarret Haven contributed six points and four rebounds, as well as senior Corbin Smith adding five points and five rebounds. As a team, the Wildcats made two of four free throws and 16 of 53 shots from the field. The Wildcats, 2-15, will next take on Aberdeen Christian Feb. 27 in Aberdeen.

The Northwestern boys' basketball team fell short to Leola Frederick 64-57 March 2 in Aberdeen. Senior Corbin Smith ended the game with 17 points and seven rebounds. Sophomore Derek Boekelheide backed him up with a total of 15 points. Junior Isaac Groft contributed nine points and six rebounds, while eighth-grader Caleb Schentzel added six points to the final score. As a team, the Wildcats made eight of 15 free throws and 28 of 77 shots from the field. The Wildcats finish out the season 2-17.

The Northwestern boys' basketball team was defeated by Aberdeen Christian 47-86 Feb. 27 in Aberdeen. Eighth-grader Caleb Schentzel led the team with 13 points, while junior Isaac Groft trailed close behind with 10 points and four rebounds. Senior Corbin Smith and sophomore Derek Boekelheide contributed eight points each. Boekelheide added five assists, and eighth-grader Jarret Haven added six points. As a team, the Wildcats made two of five free throws and 25 of 75 shots from the field. The Wildcats, 2-16, will next take on Leola/Frederick March 2 in Aberdeen.




The high school students went in groups of three for the whole week.

The elementary students enjoyed not only hearing a bunch of stories, but also having all of those high school students that they look up to read to them, sharing their love of reading and encouraging them to read more.


Seeing how much the first-graders enjoyed being read to reminded the high school students how much fun reading can be.

Junior Abby Fischbach reads her favorite children's book "The Big Red Hen" to the first-grade class.








Students and adults clash on social media.




