The reader's theater consists of seniors Tessa Rush and Blake Toennies and juniors Allison Braun, Kate Finley, Andrea Rausch and Codi Sparling, and is coached by Mrs. Jolinda Finley. "Our piece was pretty good. We did good for the first time writing a piece. We felt pretty good about it. State was pretty intimidating to be honest. Districts was in the basement of a church, so to be in a large convention room was a shock!" Toennies said.

"It was really fun and nice to be able to hang out with the people in it. It was very scary because it was the most people we have ever performed in front of. It was awesome that we made it all the way to state," Rush said.

"I thought that they did one of their best performances. There were 16 top schools, and only eight could get superior. I want to say we got ninth, but so does every other school. I was very proud that they wrote their own piece. They've improved a lot as a group since they started. They should be very proud they made it to state," Coach Finley said.

Thinking Outside the Cube

In psychology teacher Mrs. Jennifer Schell's class, freshman Sadie Vander Wal and sophomores Darby Duncan, Josie Clemens, Derek Boekelheide, Klaryssa Schnoor, Ali Johnson, Chelsea Sorenson and Destinee Zens learned how to complete a Rubik's Cube in four class periods.

"I was skeptical at first, but as time went by, it was quite enjoyable. Now I practice all the time," Clemens said.

Boekelheide, the only student who knew how to master the cube prior to the assignment, step by step taught the students how to put the pieces in the correct spots.

"I have solved a Rubik's Cube in 18 seconds before," Boekelheide said.

Students were instructed to write down their emotions and different types of frustrations they experienced throughout the project, while being taught by a peer to incorporate the psychological portion of the project.

"I felt relieved and exhilarated

once we finally solved it," Duncan said.

The students all felt like the process was extremely difficult to explain the process without ever attempting or completing one before.

The Rubik's Cube is a 3-D combination puzzle invented in 1974 by Hungarian sculptor and professor or architecture Erno Rubik.

Originally called the Magic Cube, the puzzle was licensed by Rubik to be sold by Ideal Toy Corp and became an instant 1980s phenomenon.

In a classic Rubik's Cube, each of the six faces is covered by nine stickers, each of one of six solid colors: white, blue, red, orange, yellow, and green.

An internal pivot mechanism enables each face to turn independently, thus mixing up the colors. For the puzzle to be solved, each face must be returned to consisting of one color.

The psychology class enjoyed this new challenge and brought back an '80s classic.

Isaac Groft said.


Many juniors and seniors took part in the event, along with staff and community members.

Precautionary Strategies Should Be Taken to Make the Highway 281 Intersection Safer

This is no secret that there have been many accidents at the intersection between Mellette and Northville. We also know that some of these accidents were not just "fender benders." No. These accidents have caused death. The intersection that we send most of our students through every day has caused tragedy, grief and pain among many family members. not just within out community but oustide as well.

Recently, we have taken some measures to keep our drivers safe, but is it enough? To our intersection we have added two street lights, two wide stop signs and two flashing yellow signs that can cut through fog. That is great. That is wonderful. It ONLY took several people dying and several close calls over the course of several years for that to happen. Is it enough? Should we, as a community, settle for this when it comes to the safety for our families' lives? Should we really be grateful that they actually did anything at all!? We do not know about you, but we think we can do better.

Thankfully, we have made it through the scary harvest season. Semi drivers, we encourage you to be extra careful as our students are traveling to and from school. They do not have as much experience driving as you do, and we ask that you please take the time to look out for them.

Winter time seems to have snuck up on most of us, and along with winter comes icy, snowy roads. Many people find themselves caught up in the rush of life and

forget to slow down and drive cautiously during these times, causing many accidents and sometimes deaths around the holiday season. With family members and friends traveling home to visit, there will be many more drivers on the road. Among these drivers, lie young teens with not nearly as much experience with driving, who tend to be distracted by texting, music and just about anything in general. Please, look both ways, stop for just a second longer at stop signs, slow down just a hair and do anything to drive safely this holiday season.

Please remember to stay safe this winter!

With the winter season and icy road conditions approaching, drivers need to take more caution while driving. Early mornings for basketball players could be a dangerous activity when the temperatures drop. Drivers should prepare cars with needed supplies such as a blanket, rope, jumper cables, water and a small snack in case of an emergency. Try to carry a cellphone with you in case you have car troubles. The winter conditions could make the area hard to see everything, so be extra careful when driving. Always make sure to have a winter kit in your car including a blanket, tow rope, jumper cables, windshield scraper, and a flashlight in case you do become stuck somewhere. Never leave your car if you become stuck during a snow storm, always stay in your car until someone arrives to help.



Our famous intersection between Mellette and Northville should not have to be a scary place to be driving. Unfortunately, it is, and several accidents are reported every year. Please slow down and use some common sense!

Take Action!

Do you feel an intersection needs a traffic light because it's too dangerous, or there is never a break in traffic to allow someone to cross? Here are some tips on how you can get on installed.

Ask your town engineer and/or police chief if the intersection has ever been studied. If it has, find out the last time it was and request a new study. If it has not, make your argument to the engineer and the town council why a study is warranted. A traffic light will only be installed if the intersection meets at least one of these criteria:

- *Excessive volume in eight- and four-hour periods.
- *Rush-hour congestion.
- *Pedestrian delays.
- *School crossing hazards.
- *Traffic flow problems.

*History of collisions.

Once the study is completed, and if the intersection meets one of these criteria, a request can be made by the town to the state Department of Transportation, which will make the final decision.


