"FFA will bring a variety of leadership skills, many cheer opportunities to this school. You can win over 77 different awards in FFA," ag teacher Mrs. Noelle Swanson said.

Swanson wants to get the students involved because of the region in which students live. She has many events planned for the classes. The ag

class went to land judging, Sept. 7.

"Land judging is to teach the student the most intensive use of land. Either that means rotating crops, or using them as grazing. The students had to detect the slope of a hill with nothing but their brains. We did well for the first time," Swanson said.

"Basically there is a in the competitive areas large hole in the ground that you can judge the land from. Overall, it was a great experience and definitely something different from what any other extracurricular activity offers," junior Sadie Vander Wal said.

Swanson took the ag class to Woonsocket to land judge. Students received 20 minutes to find out the textural group, soil, depth, past erosion, slope, stoniness, permeability, surface runoff, limiting factors and land capability, along with field conditions and recommended land treatments. The highest score and the closest to the correct judging won.

FFA provides the fifth largest scholarship in the nation and the largest youth organization. Swanson really wants to get FFA as big as FBLA that has been in the school awhile now.

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

Vander Wal's Bovine Project Heats up Phoenix



Junior Sadie Vander Wal advanced to the International Science Fair in Phoenix, Ariz., last May due to her outstanding performances at local fairs.

After placing first at the school's science fair and Northern State University's regional fair, Vander Wal became a finalist with the opportunity to fly out to Phoenix for the International Science Fair (ISEF). Gladly accepting, the junior, teacher Mr. Charles Hermanson from Aberdeen Central and Northern State University, Professor Dr. Elkhader departed on May 8 to partake in a life-changing experience. Mrs. Denise Clemens, the Northwestern science teacher, expresses much pride in Wander Val.

represented our school, community and state very well. This is Sadie's second year going to the International Science Fair, so her experience helped her out. This year I can just tell that her leadership and skills have really improved from last year. I am yerv excited to see what Sadie will do this year for her science fair project!" Clemens said. The International fair differs greatly from our local fair here at Northwestern. "The whole experience was extremely eye-opening for me. For a small-town farm girl, going to a big city with thousands of people from all over the world is not something I'm used to. Getting to meet new people from all over is so beneficial as I learned a lot of cultures," Vander Wal said. "I'm so grateful that Northern gave me this opportunity to present my project there and help teach people the importance of agriculture to South Dakota and my community."

Vander Wal tested to see how air exposure at different time intervals affected the viability of bovine (cattle) semen that is used when artificially inseminating cows. Vander Wal wanted to find the maximum time she could keep straws of semen above the frost line and still maintain viability standards for artificial insemination process. In her findings, Vander Wal found out that air temperature drastically declines viability of semen, and the 30 seconds is the maximum amount of time it can be left out. ISEF had a big impact on Vander Wal and her future

Seniors take off to Boundary Waters



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State Fair 2016

The South Dakota State Fair in South Dakota attracted a record crowd number of 1,943,719 people over the 12 day event, starting Labor day and ending on September 5, breaking the 2014 attendance record. According to some of Northwestern's high school students the fair was a success, the good weather and good food were factors that attracted the huge crowd. A new school year brings new projects, and this year Northwestern decided to go green through recycling.



Northwestern encourages the Wildcat fans to take the time to put their recyclable waste during home games into the available bins instead of the garbage.







Not only to improve my English but also to have new experiences, meet new people, new places, different cultures, get out of my confort zone, to study and to play volleyball!




To start, paint a base coat on your nails (from left to right starting with blue, white and gold stripes, gold, blue, blue.) When painting your nails, any color choice will work. For the finger nail with the stripes on it, I cut pieces of tape in straight lines. That way, I could just stick them on and paint over it. I also put a heart on the striped nail (this step is optional). To make the heart, you have two options. One option would be to use a dotting tool and make two dots then connect them with the point at the bottom. The other option would be to use a piece of tape to cut a heart out, then use that as your stencil. Lastly, finish your nails with a clear top coat.

³/₄ cups oatmeal
1 cup flour

¹/₂ tsp. salt
1 tsp. cinnamon

¹/₂ cup butter or margarine

Place apple slices in a 2-quart casserole dish and combine the dry ingredients. Cut shortening into the dry ingredients until crumbly. Sprinkle topping evenly over the sliced apples and place in a 350 degree oven for 15-20 minutes.

This dish will be making 8 servings. Each serving has 279 calories, 41 grams of carbohydrate, 12 grams of fat and 273 mg of sodium.
