# Groft wins Women In Science Logo Contest





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
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## One-act third at regions

#### Animal Print

First, put a base coat any color of your choice on your nails. Making a zebra print is one of the easiest animal prints. Simply take a small brush and make lines until you get a zebra-like pattern.

The next technique could be used for a turtle shell design or a giraffe, depending on the color choice. First, paint the base coat, and while it is still wet, drop dots of a different color on your nail and let it spread on its own.

Lastly, there is the cheetah print. First, start by placing dots on your nail using a dotting tool. Using the same dotting tool and black nail polish, carefully trace around the dot. Do not connect the lines around the dots.

Finish with a clear top coat.


