

FFA Students Place at Nationals

On Oct. 25-28, the national FFA convention was held in Indianapolis, Ind. The Northwestern students who attended included sophomore Chrissy Stoltenberg, freshmen Jackson Mielke and Jace Haven and senior Sadie Vander Wal.

Haven placed second in Power Systems: Division 1 agriscience fair

"I did agriscience, which is a science fair project. I tested shelters and explained which shelter was the warmest and why. The round shelter was the warmest and flat shelter was coldest and presented it to three judges," Haven said.

Vander Wal placed sixth out of 41 participants at the national convention in employment skills, or job interview, category. Prior to the competition, she submitted her resume, cover letter and job application online. In addition,

she was able to come up with the job description for the job she wanted to apply for, which was a bovine genetics technician lab assistant. She also completed an initial phone interview with a judge a few weeks before the competition. All of these components were judged prior to her arrival in Indianapolis. On the first day of competition, she was interviewed by a panel of judges and then completed her follow-up letter. At the completion of this day, she remained in the top 12 competitors and advanced to the semi-final round. In this round, she interviewed with three different judges. Her average score with these interviews then placed her in the top six, which advanced her to the final round of competition. In this round, she completed a networking activity scenario in which she talked to judges about the

career she was applying for at an expo center and a job offer telephone interview in which she had to accept her job offer and ask the appropriate questions when receiving a job. After all three rounds, Vander Wal placed sixth overall, earning her a gold medal and scholarship money. Haven placed second out of 13 participants at the national convention. Haven was in division 1. He was one of the 12 finalists. For agriscience, he would present to judges and explain and describe his results and the process.

"Receiving a gold on the national level is definitely not something I ever expected to complete within my short time with the FFA. Coming into the competition, I knew that I was up against state officers, college freshmen, and students who had been in FFA for at least

four years, if not more. However, I did not let the fact that I was the youngest competitor there stop me. I put a lot of time and dedication into completing my cover letter and resume, and when it came time to interview at nationals, I simply conveyed to the judges exactly who I was and why I was the perfect fit for the "job" I was applying for. It was a nerve-racking experience, but it was reward-

ing. I set my mind to fulfilling this goal for myself, and I was able to achieve it. This experience was nothing short of extraordinary, and I am so thankful for the opportunities that this FFA chapter, the school, and the community have given me," Vander Wal said.

Up next for FFA is another state competition in Dec. 3-4 in Pierre.

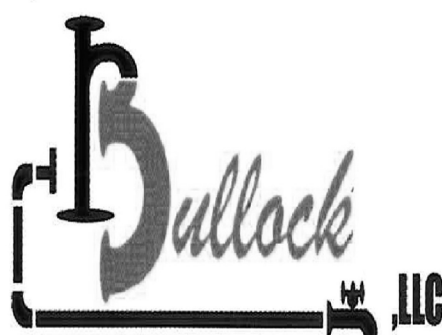
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Hoop Dancer Comes to NW for a Week

An Artist in Residence came to the school during the week of Nov. 6-10 to show her American Indian culture. Her American name is Star Chief Eagle. Star Chief Eagle shows the art of hoop dancing. She started when she was first born by watching and gradually beginning to learn the art, and now, she is 23 years old and has mastered hoop dancing with 23 hoops. Students in grades kindergarten to senior came down to the gym to experience this art. She taught the crowd some simple American Indian words like "bear" and "eagle". She explained that American Indian hoop dancing symbolizes different animals that they make. It also can help hunters get in the mindset to hunt.

She had a lot of the students, and even the teachers, go out onto the floor to attempt the dancing. The younger children just did simple moves, such as holding the hoop up in the air or spinning it on the ground. She also had the middle school students try hoop dancing. The middle school

students made a huge circle and were all running toward each other in a circle. By the end of their dance they were all in a little circle in the middle of the floor. The last activity she had the audience do was have a competition between eight high-schoolers and eight first-graders. They had to hold hands while trying to move the hoop through their body onto the next person's. The first-graders won this

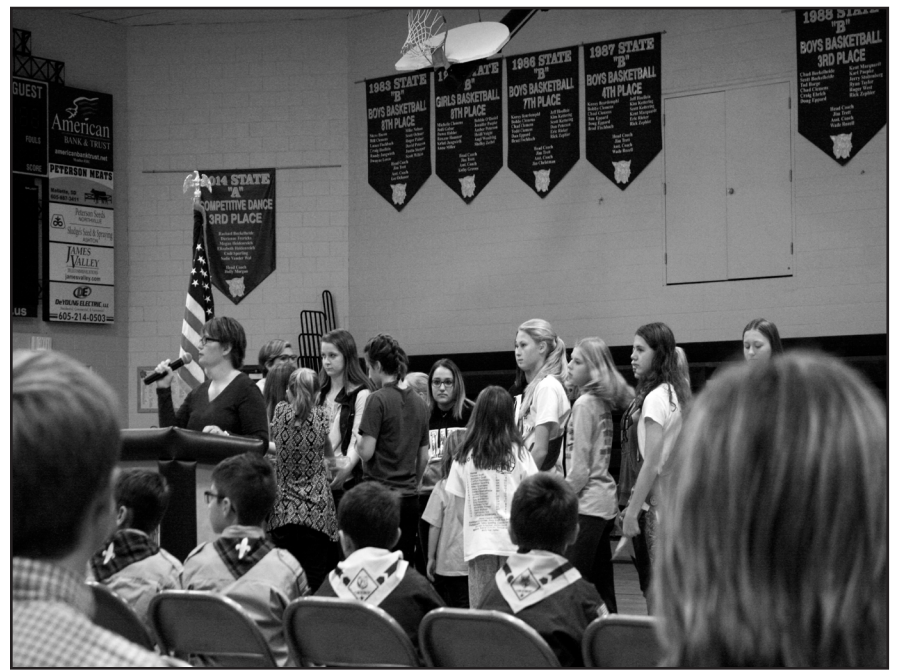

Back-to-Back State Champions

The Wildcats ended the season as the 2017 Class B State Champions. The Wildcats went into the tournament as the No. 1 seed and as the defending champions.

In the first round, the Wildcats took on Faith and won 3-0. The Wildcats were led by sophomore Miranda Thorson with two aces, junior Caitlyn Fischbach with 13 kills, sophomore Madalyn Groft with 35 assists and 15 digs and two blocks by junior Riley Grandpre.

Northwestern advanced to the semi-finals to face Herreid/Selby. The Wildcats beat the Wolverines 3-0 to make it into the championship round. The Wildcats were led by freshman Hannah Schentzel with two aces, 15 kills and three blocks from Grandpre, M. Groft with 38 assists and senior Addison Sparling with 12 digs.

The Wildcats went into the state championship round versus the No. 3 seed the Warner Monarchs. This is the first time ever that the two rivals got to

face each other in a state game. The Wildcats went into the game knowing it was going to be intense.

The Wildcats took the first set 25-17. The second set was a hard-fought battle, but the Monarchs came out on top with a score of 23-25. Entering the third set, the Wildcats were down but came back to win 25-20. The Wildcats ended the game in the fourth set 28-26. The team was led by Schentzel with two aces, Fischbach with 19 kills and seven blocks, M. Groft had 49 assists, and senior Peyton Groft

with 25 digs. Grandpre, Fischbach and Groft were all named to all-tournament team.

Junior Caitlyn Fischbach finished second overall for the school's record of kill efficiency, having a .435 kill efficiency. Senior Peyton Groft broke the school's career digs record with 1,692. Sophomore Madalyn Groft also broke the school's record with 1,064 assists in a season.

The Wildcats ended the season with a 35-1 record.

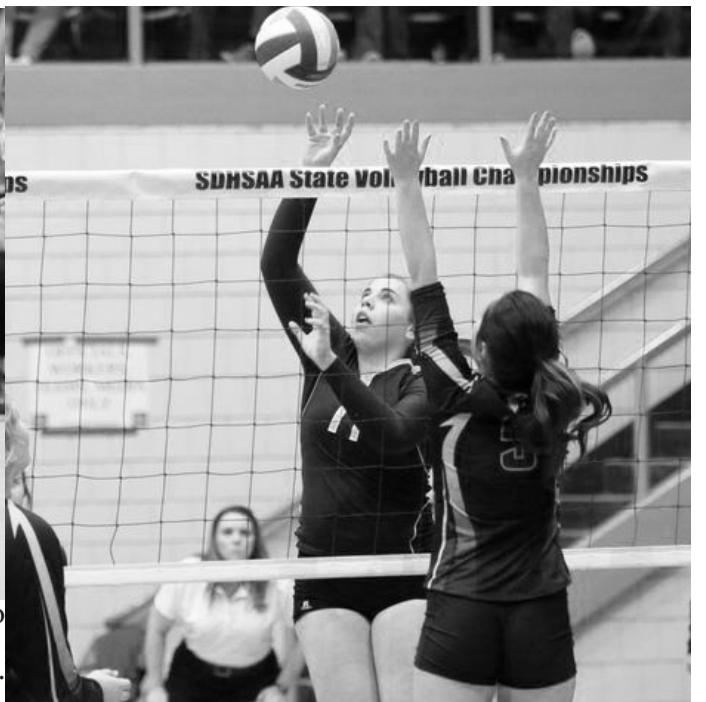

Other may not enjoy

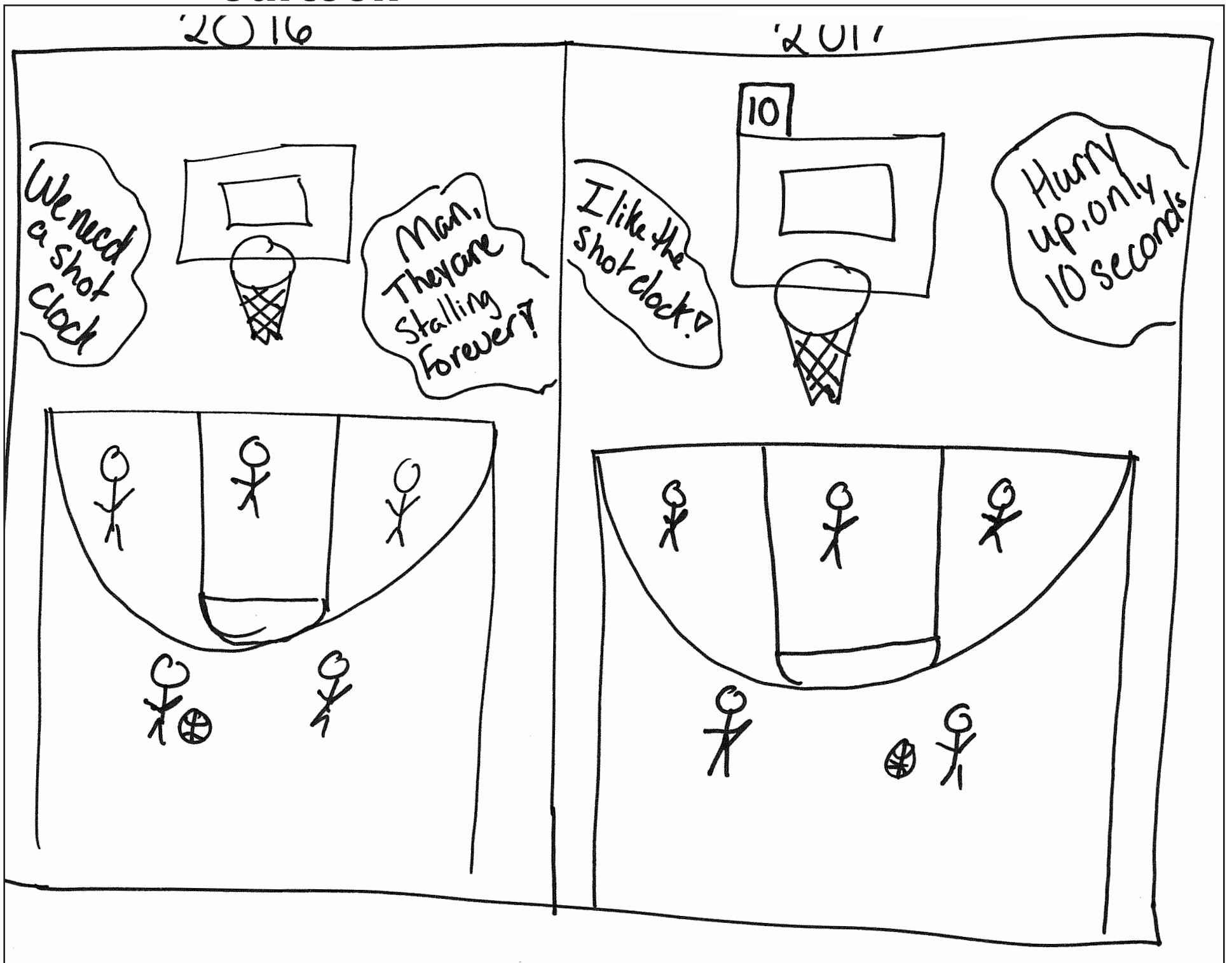
not having as much time as they need to score or to stall at the end of a close game. Teams who pride themselves on their ball control and defense at the end of games will need to revise their game management strategies.

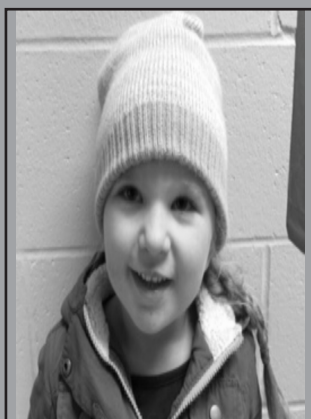

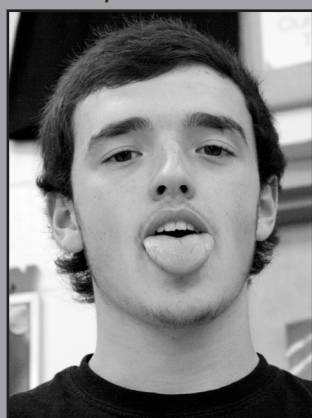

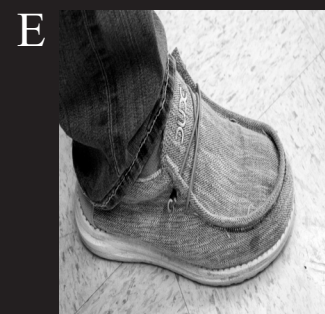
