
Cross Country Runners Advance to State




The Northwestern cheer and dance team completed their season at the state competition on Friday, Oct. 20 in Rapid City.



Having the top teams at the state tournament will also make sure the best competition is participating in the state tournament. This year the state tournament will be held out in Rapid City Nov. 16, 17 and 18.




